## New Outdoor Classroom

At MHS we love 'The Great Outdoors' and so were delighted that the Outdoor Classroom was built at the start of term. Nestled in the grounds, it provides a new focal point to support our outdoor learning activities across the curriculum.

We know that while it is the grades acquired in the classroom that will earn pupils their scholarships and senior school places, it is the character skills that will prepare them for life and their future wellbeing.

At MHS, outdoor learning supports the development of character strengths and transferrable skills, such as problem-solving, creativity and resilience. Our wonderful new outdoor classroom, complete with benches, desks and weatherproof blinds (to enable use whatever the weather!) is a wonderful asset in this area, providing new opportunities for children to develop their characters and a much-needed antidote to the increased screen time that they have all experienced over the past year.



# Year 3's 'Forests of the Future' Trip

At Marlborough House we are very lucky to have Bedgebury Pinetum, a world-leading collection of conifers (over 350!), on our doorstep. This term, Year 3 were the first school group to visit Bedgebury Pinetum since March 2020, and what a trip it was!

The focus for the day was 'Forests of the Future', culminating in 'Forest Heroes' status for all the children after they had completed a series of fun challenges. The aim was to understand why forests are so important for the planet, the climate and the environment, supporting both Year 3's Summer Term topic on Rainforests and the whole school's focus on environmental education.

During the day, Year 3 learnt about how to preserve, care for trees and what we can do to stop species going extinct, with the first topic focusing on exploring the current threats to trees globally. Then we moved further into the forest and, after an exciting game where they attempted to base themselves in a tree that was safe from felling, they built a visual forest cycle in teams. We discovered the importance of the forest cycle in sustainable forest management and heard about the work of the Forest Stewardship Council.

Next up for our Forest Heroes was tree identification, with the children challenged to find the right tree, take a bark rubbing, collect cones and label their specimens to bring back to school.

We also heard about what the children can do as individuals to help protect trees against the threats they face, including disease and animals, culminating in a true or false session to remind ourselves what we had learnt.

Last up was a fascinating case study on the Malawi Cedar which grows on Mount Mulanje. At one point, this incredibly valuable and durable tree was so sort after that there were only seven trees left in the world. Since then the local villagers, a community nursery, expert foresters and places like Bedgebury, have worked together to rebuild and protect the population of Malawi Cedar.

Well done to all our Year 3 Forest Heroes, who were awarded a series of wooden medals which are hanging in the classroom to help us remember our trip.

### Outdoor Classroom Day

The weather held and we celebrated Outdoor Classroom Day with an official opening of our Outdoor Classroom, lots of outdoor learning and a healthy dose of fresh air.

Thank you to our Head Girl Sophia C and Head Boy Rex C for performing the honours of opening the new classroom, ably supported by Mr Newton and the children of Reception.

The day saw a host of outdoor learning activities for all the children. The Modern Languages Department led the way with: using 'Connect 4' to practise French verbs at the Leavers Table; Spanish in the bell tent for the older children; and a mini Spanish 'colour run' for the younger children as they toured the grounds identifying colours. Maths was enjoyed outside for much of Pre-Prep and Year 3, with Year 5 spending their maths lesson decorating the paving stones in geometric shapes as part of their introduction to angles (and street art!). Year 3 had been learning about time in maths and did a practical activity linked to clocks before designing their own clocks. After break they did a hunt around the school, linked to their topic on rainforests, before using natural objects for an activity on symmetry. Year 4 enjoyed a busy forest school session, but made time to enjoy some mindful moments under the trees.

Everyone enjoyed a picnic lunch outside, making the most of the bean bags, tents and tipis, before settling to enjoy more outside activities in the afternoon, including Games for the Prep School. Reception had story time in the bell tent which looked very snuggly, enjoyed an al fresco music class and tried their hand at creating words from natural objects. Nursery took on their own tree planting project, potting up sycamore saplings for the children to take home. Inspired by our school eco initiative and to support 'Plant a tree for the Jubilee', these baby trees are extra special as the parent tree grows in the nursery garden and it has kindly donated the children a sapling each!





# **Robin Hood Day**

We had a beautiful sunny morning after half term for our Year 4 Robin Hood Activity Day. Our first activity was a debate where Robin was on trial for being a thief. The children purposely strode out into the bright sunshine to go to the court of law (AKA the playground) with a burning question on their minds - Is Robin Hood Good or Bad? Each child was in 'role' as Knights, Guards, Poor Farmers with children to feed, Merry Companions, Noble people, Villagers and many more. Robin Hood (Mrs Robinson) bravely spoke to the court to explain his deeds and actions whilst the court listened intently. Then the action began with the children in character stating who they were and how they felt about Robin Hood. There were many passionate speeches made with tales of starving families saved by Robin Hood, of his bravery and generosity. But then the counter arguments came thick and fast, the court heard of Noble people robbed in the forest, of horses stolen by Robin and his companions and many other dark deeds of skulduggery and thieving.

After much debate and all in the court had chance to put forward their opinion of Robin Hood, up stepped the defence lawyer (Mrs Jones) who eloquently spoke on behalf of Robin to the court and said why he was not guilty of any offence. Underneath the glorious canopy of trees, Year 4 set to chopping and preparing vegetables for a hearty stew which simmered over a roaring fire. While lunch bubbled away, we sang ballads telling the age old story of Robin Hood, the prowess of his archery skills and his robbing of the rich to give to the poor.

A magnificent time was had by all, rallying cries called 'Archers Ready!' and the reply 'Arrows Drawn!' every scrap of stew was eaten,

stories told and songs sung, banners painted and hats designed and worn.

Celebrating all things Shakespearean, Brush Up Your Shakespeare was a collection of sketches and songs inspired by the Bard.
