A Virtual Start of Term

Children were welcomed back this term with a show of school spirit from their teachers in a fun video reminding them to be kind, to work hard, and not to worry!

Over the first national lockdown, this emotional support proved more important for children than academic progression, but it was gratifying for us to see that pupils had lost almost no technical ground; something we set out to repeat in lockdown 3.0, with a focus

on well-being and the continuity of high-quality education.

Classrooms and events at Marlborough House moved online, providing remote learning and daily live link-ups for Reception to Year 8, while our Nursery remained open. In addition, we had



25 children of key workers being educated and cared for onsite.

Well done to our new starters this term who enjoyed a virtual welcome as they joined their new classes for the first time online.

In the first half of term we opened a testing centre onsite. Many thanks to our School Nurse, Mrs Rushton, for coordinating testing, supported by her team of school staff helpers.

Lockdown Well-Being

We are dedicated to promoting positive mental health in young people, not just as a standalone initiative tacked on to the curriculum, but as an integrated part of our daily lives at school. As our school moved online, so did this provision, with an increased emphasis on well-being across the whole school community.

During online learning, teachers' daily live linkups with children enabled them to continue to offer emotional support to even our youngest pupils. One size did not fit all, but communication was key, as was resilience and independence from the children.

In addition, live PSHE (Personal, Social, Health and Economic Education) lessons, for Reception to Year 8, provided an established framework for growing the children's characters and delivering skills to support good mental health.

In Pre-Prep PSHE lessons, Mrs Reid, Head of Pre-Prep, talked about the core character strengths. When discussing resilience in Year 2 PSHE, they looked at how Anna (Frozen), Woody (Toy Story) and Merida (Brave) all show 'stickability' and keep going when things get tough. Children were rewarded for showing they were able to resist something or for persevering when they found something hard - "two house points for showing resilience and self-control"! They also reflected on 'Valuing Self and Others' - being kind to yourself and other people, with wristbands being posted to those who had helped out at home.

In the Prep School, we follow the Jigsaw PHSE scheme of work. This is a mindful



approach to PHSE, to encourage independence of thought and appreciation of contemplation. This term children were reflecting on 'Celebrating Difference', in live lessons with Mrs Walker, Head of PSHE; providing further opportunity to talk about how everyone was coping with lockdown life.



Children across the school were encouraged to stay active. Pre-Prep to Year 4 continued their focus on outdoor learning, with optional Forest School activities for families to participate in - providing another notable reminder of the positive effects of the great outdoors on

our mental health and well-being. In the Prep School, live workout classes from the Sports department were a great success, ensuring children enjoyed the benefits of exercise during a winter lockdown. *RR & CW*
