Year 6 Geography virtual workshop with the Natural History Museum

Year 6 were fortunate to enjoy a visit from the Natural History Museum (NHM) this term.

With the wonders of technology that we have all become so accustomed to using, pupils gathered in the Hopkins Hall and enjoyed a 'virtual' workshop on earthquakes and volcanoes, their current topic in Geography.

In addition to revising some of their geographical knowledge, pupils explored the structure of the earth, including tectonic plates and how their movements can lead to earthquakes. With the assistance of models at the NHM, the class created an earthquake of their own and learnt of the damage earthquakes can cause, how scientists record this data and the equipment they use.

They also studied how igneous rock is formed and discovered the power of explosive eruptions. They learnt about the clues and evidence scientists look for when identifying these types of volcanoes and the dangers they can pose. In the final section of the workshop, the class were called upon to decide the fate of 'Volcano Town'; using their newly gained knowledge to gather data, make predictions on the volcano in question and correctly decided to evacuate the town, just in time.

Recycling Food Waste at MHS



As part of our aim to be a green school and to improve our impact on the environment, we are pleased to now be recycling all our food waste, both cooked and in its raw stage.

All food waste is placed in designated red bins which are located in the kitchen preparation and cooking area, with additional bins in the dining room. This waste is collected once a week, as part of an already established food waste collection round, and taken to a new, local anaerobic digester plant near Maidstone, where it will be converted into gas and electricity.

The biogas will be fed directly into the National Grid, as well as powering the plant itself and creating farm fertiliser.

Well done to the children who are doing a good job of minimising waste and ensuring any waste is going into the new red bins.



RHS School Gardening Award

In order to gain this next level, the children had to:

- use tools like a professional gardener to dig, rake and sow
- know how to protect their plants against the weather, pests and diseases

Equine Therapy

Life extends well beyond the classroom at Marlborough House School where, as part of Children's Mental Health Week, Rocket the pony visited pupils for some equine therapy.

Through our weekly enrichment opportunities within the school day, we have already seen how beneficial riding lessons have been for pupils across the Prep School and the happiness and confidence these sessions bring. As a school which aims to educate characters, as well as minds, we wanted to build upon this and extend the experience so that it was accessible to more children.

One aspect we explored in the session was that animals and humans don't require words to communicate. The communication that we saw was solely on an emotional level, allowing the children to be more vulnerable around animals than they may be with other people. It was both fascinating and hugely rewarding to see this personal development being modelled by the children in Year 3 during the outdoor learning session with Rocket.

Being around horses also helps to open up a nonjudgmental and unbiased relationship in which a person can learn to express and understand themselves better. The horse will intuitively mirror feelings, making them very empathetic. Again, Rocket was a superstar in mirroring curiosity as he stopped by the Prep School classrooms, and then calmness and enjoyment when he was out at Forest School.

It was a hugely successful visit and a lovely addition to the multiple activities that took place during Children's Mental Health Week.

The children were a delight as ever, and Rocket thoroughly enjoyed his day out!

Year 5 Farm Trip

Year 5 battled the cold, wet elements in February to visit Stevens Farm, the wonderful home to our very own Mrs Budd.

The children were shown the orchards, including apple trees recently planted with geographical satellite information alone, saving numerous man-hours. They followed the path of a commercial apple, from the tree to the packing house, through the sorting process and into cold storage. To enjoy apples at their best, did you know that you should keep apples in the fridge and only bring them out a couple at a time to bring them back to room temperature?



The damaging environmental impact of the packaging was discussed, as were the efforts that go into using technology to minimise wasteful fertiliser. The size and expense of the machinery was mind-blowing, as was the technology that goes into a supermarket staple. The children were encouraged not to buy fruit packed in 'crunchy plastic', as it cannot be recycled, or fruit from abroad as it adds to food miles. It was a cold and damp visit but full of interest and insight... and it made their apples taste even better at the end!

Early Civilisations Project in Year 4

History in Year 4 this term is learning about Early Civilisations. In particular the children have been discovering about the first writing systems. They learnt that the very first writing system in the world was invented by the Sumerians around 3300 BC.

This led the children to make their own clay tablets and just like the Sumerians they used a reed called a stylus to carefully mark the intricate symbols into the clay. They discovered that writing was first used by the Sumerians as a way of keeping track of goods that were traded with other people. Eventually, they used writing to record stories, poems, laws and contracts.

Year 4's clay tablets were a mixture of their own stories, quotes and sayings, and I was very impressed how they could read out their own ancient writing! Everyone worked very hard to make the ancient writing on their tablets intricate and beautiful.

The Great Fire of London workshop started with Year 2 watching as their cardboard houses burned, just as they would have done in 1666. An exciting start to the morning!

The children then moved into the Hopkins Hall to continue their morning of hands on learning about life in Stuart England. Having dressed up in 1666 style clothes to fully immerse themselves in the era, the children became involved in making clothes for the poor people who had lost their belongings in the fire - trying their hand at weaving in the process. They also made little scent bags which were very common at the time and helped to keep people healthy and happy.

Next up, Year 2 were given the task of making a candleholder; an essential item to enable them to see at night. Everyone enjoyed moulding the clay candleholders, which featured wells and handles. Using a quill and ink, the children wrote letters to King Charles II or decorated their own names. Finally, ornate fire plaques were designed and made by a process of printing on to foil. An enjoyable and busy day for the children with some wonderful feedback from all involved.
